How to Use This Guide

Each day of our devotional journey offers a unique opportunity for personal and congregational growth. The first twenty days center on the individual believer, providing insights and reflections tailored to deepen personal connection with God. Subsequently, from days 21 to 40, our focus shifts to the church, encouraging a shared exploration of faith within our congregation.

As you engage in this daily devotional, start by immersing yourself in the selected Scripture for the day, allowing the Word to resonate in your heart. Following this, delve into the accompanying devotion, designed to illuminate and apply the principles found in the Scriptures. Each day presents not only a memory verse to internalize but also a thought-provoking question, prompting personal reflection and spiritual contemplation. Additionally, find a prayer prompt that aligns with the day's theme, guiding you in intentional and meaningful communication with God. Embrace this holistic approach to your daily devotions, fostering both personal and communal spiritual growth.



Read the Scripture verses for the day. Pray for guidance, then read them slowly and meditate on their meaning.



This is the memory verse for the day. If you can't memorize a new verse every day, don't fret. Just do the best you can. Memorizing some is better than memorizing none!



Think about these questions. Sometimes the answers are obvious, sometimes they may require some deeper thought. Avoid the temptation to skip over these!



Use this prayer prompt to get you started. Don't feel like you have to pray it word-for-word, and don't feel like you have to stop after you read the prompt! Pray as the Holy Spirit leads. If you are going through this as a family, consider taking turns praying a short prayer.

Guide to Fasting

Understanding Fasting

Fasting is a spiritual discipline that involves voluntarily abstaining from food as a means of seeking spiritual growth, self-discipline, and a deeper connection with God.

Purpose of Fasting

The primary purpose of fasting is to draw nearer to God through intentional sacrifice and self-denial. By setting aside time for fasting, individuals seek spiritual clarity, humility, and a heightened awareness of their dependence on God. Fasting is not merely about abstaining from food; it's a deliberate act of consecration, allowing believers to refocus their hearts and minds on spiritual matters, accompanied by prayer and reflection.

Guidelines for Fasting

- Choose the Type of Fast: There are various types of fasts, including water fasts, partial fasts (abstaining from specific foods), or even technology fasts
- For the 40 days of prayer and fasting, we encourage a fast from all food and drink (Except water)
- If you are not able to fast from food for medical reasons, do not attempt a food fast, simply choose another type of fast
- If you are in doubt, consult your doctor
- For the 40 days of prayer and fasting, we encourage you to fast every Monday for a total of 6 fasts
- We encourage a 24 hour fast which means you would eat Sunday dinner and not eat again until Monday dinner
- If you are going through the 40 days of prayer and fasting as a family, we encourage you to fast as a family (This may seem difficult, but it is possible and will be a great spiritual blessing to your family)
- Prepare Spiritually: Before starting your fast, spend time in prayer, seek God's guidance and strength, and ask for clarity regarding your fasting goals
- Stay Hydrated: Regardless of the type of fast, staying hydrated is crucial
- Drink plenty of water throughout the fast to maintain your health

- Use the time you would typically spend on meals for prayer, reading Scripture, and meditation
- Fasting is not just about abstaining, but also about drawing closer to God (Donald Whitney says, "Without a purpose, fasting can be a miserable, selfcentered experience about will power and endurance")
- When you feel the hunger pain--without a spiritual purpose you simply think of the pain--with a spiritual purpose you feel the pain and turn your thoughts to God (For example, if you are fasting to pray for the church then every time you are hungry you pray--you will pray much more often this way)
- Listen to Your Body: Pay attention to how your body responds during the fast
- If you experience any adverse effects, consider modifying or ending the fast (Health should always be a priority)
- If you miss a fast one Monday, simply choose another day of the week or pick back up the following Monday (The purpose is to teach spiritual discipline, not to test your faithfulness)

Remember, fasting is a personal journey, and there is no one-size-fits-all approach. It's essential to approach fasting with a humble and open heart, seeking God's guidance throughout the process.

Additional prayer prompts

The daily prayer prompt is simply a starting point. Use it to start praying, and then continue with a genuine prayer from your heart. In addition to the daily prayer, here are some things you can pray for...

Pray for our church

- Pray for renewal of our faith
- Pray for God to move deeply in our hearts
- Ask Him to renew our faith of what He can do and what He wants to do in our church and our city
- Pray for people to be consistent and involved with the church
- Pray for our Easter service on March 31
 - That many people would come (even ones who have never been or have not been in a long time)
 - That Christ would be exalted
 - That people would come to know Christ

Pray for our city

- Pray for our city employees and elected officials
- Pray for our local businesses and farmers
- Pray for the welfare of our city
- Pray for the peace of our city
- Pray for the future of our city

Pray for the lost

- Pray we would be broken over the lostness around us
- Pray for at least one lost person by name
- Pray for an opportunity to share the gospel with that person (use the "Life Conversation Guides" at the church if you would like)
- Pray for a revival in our church, our community, and our world
- Pray about one person you can invite to church (use the invite cards at the church if you would like)

February 12 (Fast for 24 hours today) Day 1: Praying Like Jesus

In Matthew 6:9-13, we are given insight into how to pray with the heart and humility of Jesus. Just as He began with "Our Father in heaven," we are invited into an intimate relationship with our Heavenly Father. This acknowledgment underscores the truth that we are not isolated in our faith but are part of a broader family of believers. 
